

Before he found a way out, he never believed he was good enough or smart enough or worth while. Living in a school bus, and getting by as a musician, he realized his life came to a halt.

He found out he was going to be a father, and a friend helped him open the door to recovery. When he began his journey of change, his life turned around 180 degrees. He was able to get an education and find happiness. He is a good parent and a trustworthy individual. He is employable and has a future.

When asked if he ever felt hopeless in recovery he said yes, however never completely. He talked to people in recovery, and they told him if he did certain things it would get better. It did. There was a time in his life when the people he loved he hurt. Now he isn't so selfish; he says it's not all about him. He can be there for the people in his life.

He maintains hope with prayer and continues to go to meetings. Although he is coming up on 15 years, Jeff will not consider himself recovered. When asked why, he said because "my life has improved beyond any mark I could have imagined, why would I ever want to not continue?"







Larry became a part of The Consortium family over 7 years ago. Ever since that time he has received residential and community supports from our Options and Opportunities program. It is his support team's belief that Larry endured tremendous hardships while growing up in Belchertown State School that he is still unable to articulate. After moving out of the institution and into the community Larry has experienced being overlooked, teased, and excluded. Despite this adversity, Larry retains his curiosity, positive outlook on life, and kindness toward others.

When Larry and his support team decided to attend The Consortium's 3rd Annual Art Show, "Eclectic Dreams," at the Canal Gallery in Holyoke, Larry's life changed forever. Larry's eyes lit up as he saw walls covered with colorful, well-constructed paintings and sculptures crafted by The Consortium's Career Initiatives grantees. He was especially taken by Janice Sorensen's watercolor collage series entitled "And the dish ran away with the spoon." On that night in May of 2005, Larry found the artist in himself.

A month later, with the help of his support team, Larry applied to be a part of The Consortium's Career Initiatives program. Career Initiatives helps people in mental health, addictions, and trauma recovery start businesses and self-employment projects (several of the businesses are in the arts). In July of 2005, Larry became the first person served by Options and Opportunities to be accepted into the Career Initiatives program.

Self Advocacy

Self Advocacy is about helping people find their voice. Helping people to have equal opportunities. Helping people to have the same services and programs as others. Helping people to speak up about their needs and wishes.

The Consortium hosts two self advocacy groups - one in Holyoke/ Chicopee (Leadership Through Advocacy) and one in Springfield (Self Advocacy Network). Both groups have been very active this year working on topics ranging from: dealing with prejudiced people; guiding your i.s.p.; seeking additional services; attending the national self-advocacy conference; hosting the western regional self advocacy conference; speaking at colleges; and attending hearings on new delivery systems with D.M.R.

The program has received a grant from the Massachusetts Developmental Disabilities Council to develop a curriculum and train persons to own/operate their own small businesses. We will be making seed grants to up to ten persons to try to make their dream of self employment a reality. This is an exciting new direction for our program and we are looking forward to this new opportunity.

Each of the self advocacy groups wanted to reach out to the community and be of assistance to local projects. Leadership Through Advocacy is working with the Woman's Shelter/Compañeras here in Holyoke and will be collecting personal hygiene items for the women and children at the shelter. The Self Advocacy Network is working with the Worthington Shelter in Springfield and is collecting items for the men and women living at the shelter. Community involvement was a goal for both groups for this year.
